Unlucky Abbey Out of Rannafast Cup

Without a doubt an entertaining game for the neutral, but nonetheless Abbey Rannafast hopes were dashed for this year by a strong Carrickmacross side in the semi-final.

Beforehand, speaking with some fans, Groundskeeper Willie McCullagh said, "It's a nice morning for the game. I think it'll be a good match. Abbey to win." Manager Dr. McCavitt said before the game, "I think the first ten minutes will definitely be crucial" and indeed they were.

With the game barely a minute old, finding himself through for an attempt on goal, Jonny Morgan had his effort well saved by the keeper.

An off-the-ball incident saw Gareth Dobbins substituted due to an injured wrist; this would prove a crushing blow to the Abbey defenders, at such an early stage in the game. Despite excellent defending by the Abbey backs, a high ball into the square fell to the hands of a Carrickmacross forward who made no mistake and drove the ball home leaving the Abbey goalkeeper with no chance.

However, the Abbey kept their heads raised and close to half time the first Abbey goal came from the boot of Stevey Sands whose shot rocketed past the keeper. Carrickmacross were quick to respond and only an exellent topcorner save from Lyncho denied them another goal.

A nicely taken free by Mickey McNamee drew the first half to a close and the Abbey looked to be gradually narrowing the gap, with the score, Carrickmacross 1-7; Abbey 1-3.

At half-time, the supporters were faithful that their team could still win despite the difficulties that Mr. Kane had pointed out, "They're going to have to work very hard to win this now; they're playing up the hill and against a slight breeze."

The second half started out, as the first, with Carrickmacross getting all the scores. Two points and yet another goal came before the Abbey responded, firstly from a Michael McNamee free, which was soon followed by two tremendous goals and a point from Jonny Morgan which narrowed the deficit substantially. Carrickmacross, eager to reclaim their considerable lead, were denied several scoring opportunities by troian work from the Abbey defenders.

However, the final blow was struck with a goal that gave Carrickmacross an unassailable five point lead.

There was bitter disappointment all round and talking with the players afterwards, Martin Duggan, spoke of the sacrifices the team has made, "The panels put in a lot of effort over the past few weeks. We've come to the end of a long road."

James McGovern credited the Carrickmacross goalkeeper who pulled off some fine saves: "Their keeper saved them a good few times especially near the beginning."

Following the news last week that the Abbey Christian Brothers' Grammar School, Newry, had been crowned 'The Top Boys Grammar in Northern Ireland with their A-Level results - The 135 fifth year pupils that sat their GCSE exams were informed that they had excelled just as well. 98% of the year group had obtained at least 5 or more grades A* to C.

For the fourth year in succession the Abbey CBS has enjoyed great success at the annual 'Young Engineers for Britain' competition with twelve out of sixteen entrants securing an award, more than any other competing school.

Abbey Christian Brothers' Grammar School celebrate the top three places in GCSE technology last year. This is a unique feat, that three pupils in the same group, with the same teacher from one school should scoop the top three spots among the thousands of pupils doing GCSE Technology across Northern Ireland.

NSPIRATIONS

As we approach the opening night of OBSERVE it was fascinating to receive a wonderful insight into the acting world from a former GREAT in the ABBEY acting fraternity. Unfortunately I was not able to print all the letter, but here is a flavour from Peter Balance who remembers with fondness his amateur career with both the Abbey and Newpoint Players.

Communication is the basic premise of acting. It involves organic thought, active listening and intelligent perception. We can not talk if we do not listen. We can not listen if we do not feel and finally we can not feel if we do not relate. Relating to what a person or character says is intrinsic to our perception of human emotion.

Acting is the ability to communicate effectively. The actor communicates on three basic levels; with himself and his emotions; with the other actors and their emotions; and finally with the audience and their emotions.

This simple triangle of communication is the essence of both a successful production but also essential for life. Get into your heart, be aware of others and try to speak honestly.

'What does it mean to be Irish?' . It is neither a feeling nor a geographical placing.

This is the world that Frank McGuinness is exploring in 'Observe the sons of Ulster. Who are we? In an era where people were volunteering in their thousands, what did it mean to die for queen and country? It meant being in a place. It was about earth, blood, fire and love.

When I was in my sixth year at the Abbey I worked on this play with the Svengali of amateur theatre, Sean Hollywood. For a man who was so politically driven, he never pushed the sentiments or any doubts regarding the motives of its players on me. He allowed me to explore and absorb the Protestant culture (At that time in the moment of the play) in a way that avoids judgement.

And that essentially is what growing up is about. There is no room for judgementalism. As an audience you cannot judge; you are only presented with a cross-section of the actors' lives. One may have an opinion on the characters' motives but one must not judge those actions according to how we live our lives. There is rarely a right or wrong.

Finding a true impartiality is something I strive for but it was born and nurtured in the seat of learning that lead me (sometimes kicked me) in to a truly rounded form. Live and learn. More importantly learn and really live. Grasp opportunities; they will come under the most unexpected guises; never regret, only don't do it again and try to achieve an equilibrium that satisfies yourself, your circle and your world.
