EOIN DOES US PROUD!

Third year pupil, Eoin Monaghan, was pipped at the post in his bid to be crowned Countdown champion.

Eoin, who is in Iveagh Three, thrilled TV audiences and stumped contestants years older than him as he marched his way to the final of the popular Channel 4 quiz show.

Even following his narrow defeat in the grand final Eoin was magnanimous when interviewed by national and local newspapers alike, saying he "wasn't too disappointed" after he lost to 18-yearold Jack Hurst, a mathematics student at Pembroke College,

"I was up against probably the best player there has ever been on the show," he said. "But if someone had told me at the start, in July, that I would make it to the final I would have laughed. I was happy enough just to win one game."

The popular quiz show tests literacy and numeracy skills, pitting two contestants against each other and the famous Countdown clock.

The modest Abbey man was on a winning streak, winning eight successive shows that took him into the knockout finals, which were recorded in November.

Jack had been top seed to win, with a 116-point average to Eoin's 113. In the final the Maths student whizzed ahead, winning with 113 points to Eoin's very respectable score of 85.

Eoin lost out on the winner's prize, which included a 20-volume set of Oxford English Dictionaries, but he wasn't too disappointed as he took home a £1,000 cheque.

"I'm not sure how I'll spend it yet," he said. There have been a number of child contestants on Countdown, but few have been as successful.

Eoin's father, Peter, travelled with him for the filming at ITV Studios in Manchester for the Channel 4 show.

He said: "We are all very proud. As presenter Jeff Stelling said, it felt like two winners on the show."

"Everyone has been very supportive," Eoin said. "They had all been asking if I had won but I didn't want to spoil it, so I stayed

Zambian Immersion Project benefit from the Newry Derby

Newry schools, St Colman's and Abbey CBS, put rivalry aside and agreed to donate the gate receipts from November's derby BT MacRory Cup match to the Abbey Zambia Immersion Programme.

This Abbey Zambia Immersion Programme focuses on providing the students and teachers of the Christian Brothers' school with an opportunity to visit a developing world setting.

In so doing they become aware of the issues associated with poverty and justice in both the developed and developing world. Since the first, ground breaking immersion in 2002, the wider Abbey community has linked the generosity and compassion of the Newry and Mourne area with the challenge of daily poverty in Christian Brothers' schools in Zambia.

The Brothers, with four decades of experience in education and charity work in the country, are in an unique position to realise the hopes and dreams of those lives in Ireland and Zambia. While in Zambia, Abbey students teach in the severely underfunded schools, in the Southern town of Livingstone, bringing valuable skills and during their two-and-a-half weeks' work they experience the harsh realities of extreme poverty in a way that can only otherwise be imagined.

Since this inception of the project in 2002, a total of twenty five students and eight teachers have been to Livingstone. The difference this has made to lives, both of privileged and of the needy, cannot be fully comprehended by anyone without first-hand experience of the project's effects - in fact, the importance of first-hand experience is a fundamental feature of the project.

The hope that the experience of life for the world's most disadvantaged people will change the outlook of everyone fortunate enough to be involved is the cornerstone of the Project. The students return with a renewed energy to work for change, with a deeper understanding of what must be done to bring justice to developing nations, and, in the furthest-reaching effect of the experience, bring their enthusiasm and knowledge into the school and local community. The fundraising efforts for the project mean that the work for the group begins months before their journey to Zambia. The team's key financial aim is to donate as much money as possible to local, specific projects in southern Zambia. In this

manner, the group are able to provide the most direct possible link between where the money is raised and where the money is needed most.

The total raised from Saturday's game was £758.11 and 35 euro. Abbey teacher, Mark Grogan, who is assistant MacRory Cup coach to Jody Gormley, thanked St Colman's and those who attended for the generosity.

"There is great rivalry between the two schools, but there is also a great unity in reaching beyond both our immediate communities to help others."

"We thank the Ulster Colleges' Council for agreeing to donate the receipts and, of course, would like to show our appreciation to those who paid in to the game and are now directly helping our charity."

GCSE RESULTS CONTINUE TO IMPROVE

Last year's GCSE cohort at the Abbey Christian Brothers' Grammar School, Newry, continued the ever increasing upward spiral of improved GCSE grades, with a set of results that mean that a new record has been set for the highest number of students to obtain five or more passes and seven or more passes for the entire year group. 99% achieved five or more A*-C grades. This has increased from 96% last year. The number of pupils who achieved seven or more A*-C grades has increased from 91% last year to an impressive 98% in the summer past.

95% achieved A*-C grades. 75% achieved A*-B grades and an astonishing 40% achieved A*/A grades. Twenty three students achieved at least eight A*/A grades.

Top of the Class' is Sean Rooney with an amazing fourteen A* grades. He achieved his first A* grade in German in 2008 as a third year pupil. He added another three A*'grades last year in French, LLW and Mathematics. This year he achieved his 'super A grades' in Design and Technology, English Language, English Literature, History, Additional Mathematics, Music, Religious Studies, Double Award Science and Spanish.

Two students achieved at least twelve A*/A grades. Stephen Grant and Benjamin Sutherland achieved nine A* grades and

three A grades each. Another two pupils achieved at least eleven A*/A grades. Niall McArdle achieved eight A* grades and three A grades and Ciaran McCartan achieved five A* grades and six A grades.

Following the top performers above, four students achieved at least ten A*/A grades, including Terry Guo (eight A* grades and two A grades), Connor Hogan (five A* grades and five A grades), Neil McConville (four A* grades and six A grades) and Sean Patterson (ten A grades).

Ten students achieved at least nine A*/A grades including Conor Austin, Conor Campbell, Aidan Cunningham, Ciaran Davies, Declan Doyle, Michael Haddad, Daire McAteer, Shane McCartan, Michael McKay and Ryan Morgan. Another four students achieved at least eight A*/A grades. They

included John Cosgrove, Peter Delahunt, Cathal McNulty and Donal O'Neill.

A delighted Headmaster, Mr Dermot McGovern, thanked staff and parents and congratulated all the students who received GCSE results – not only the boys who had done exceptionally well but also the boys who had done as well as they possibly could. He believes that a number of factors have combined to help with this year's success, including a very dedicated, committed and highly professional staff who got the best out of this year group. The most valuable gift any teacher can give a pupil in the Abbey is their own time and this was given in abundance.

Support from parents was another area highlighted by Mr McGovern that facilitated these results, working in harmony with the Abbey by attending Parent/Teacher meetings and helping to implement recommendations that were agreed at 'Progress Meetings' that were set up to support students.

Pupils in Year 11 have also performed very well after completing numerous GCSE examinations following their first year of study and can look forward to matching this year's GCSE results next year.





The Abbey Christian Brothers' Grammar School, Newry, is celebrating yet another exceptional set of A-Level results. This is the first group of Advanced Level pupils to have completed their examinations in the new school after moving from the Courtenay Hill site to Castleowen last January. Another significant highlight for the 'Class of 2010' is that over one third of Upper sixth achieved at least one A* grade, which has been introduced by the examining boards this year for the first time to acknowledge 'super A grades'. Candidates must achieve 90% in their exams to be awarded this.

A quarter of the year group achieved at least three 'A' grades. Almost 50% of all results were grades A*/A, 77% were grades A*-B and 93% grades A*-C.

A total of twenty four pupils achieved three or more grade A's.

Ten pupils achieved four 'A' grades. Niall Burke, from Newry, obtained A* grades in Accounts, Mathematics and Music and an A grade in History. He added to this impressive haul with an A grade in AS Further Mathematics. He is now studying Actuarial Science at London School of Economics. Niall Duffy, from Killeavy, obtained A* grades in Chemistry and Geography and A grades in Biology and Mathematics. He has moved on to study Medicine at Queen's University, Belfast. John McCaul, from Newry, obtained A* grades in History and Irish and A grades in Government and Politics and Spanish. He is now taking a gap year. Oliver Hearty, from Mullaghbawn, obtained an A* grade in

Biology and A grades in Chemistry, Irish and Mathematics. He has begun a course in Medicine at Queen's University, Belfast. Ronan Kearney, from Newry, obtained an A* grade in Biology and A grades in ICT, Mathematics and Religious Studies. He gone across the water and is doing Psychology with Philosophy at St. Andrews. Niall McCartan, from Warrenpoint, obtained an A* grade in Mathematics and A grades in Biology, Chemistry and Physics. He too has opted to move to England to study Medicine at Liverpool University. This is quite a feat when the Government had announced that 1 in 10 candidates had achieved an A* grade nationally. He is delighted that 25% of Upper Sixth achieved at least three A grades and that virtually every boy achieved his first choice University place. He also congratulated the Lower Sixth pupils who performed excellently in their AS examinations. My name is Karl Gray and I live in Jonesborough Co Armagh. I am 11 years old and my birthday is the 24th November.

There are 6 people altogether in our family. My dad is called Adrian and he is originally from Newry, County Down. His parents were Jim and Bernadette Gray. My mum is called Hannah and she was born in Sunderland. Her mother Sue is half Scottish and her father Brian is English.

I have three brothers called Myles, Scott and Ryan. Myles is 19, Scott is 17 and Ryan is 8. My dad's parents are both dead. His father Jim died on 3rd of May 2003 and his mother Bernadette died on the 26th of November 2009 which was two days after my birthday. My mum's parents are both still alive. I have four uncles called Des, Phillip, Mark and Dec. My uncle Des is the one that got married over the summer holidays. I was at the wedding. It was brilliant and we stayed at the Lough Erne Golf Resort.

I have five aunties called Anne Marie, Orlaith, Heather, Oonagh and Helen. One of my aunties is not married. I have five first cousins: David, Lauren, Sean and Ciaran, but Ross sadly passed away when I was 2 years old.

My great-grandfather Charles Donald was in the British army and he fought in World War I. He survived it and he became head of Kodak in Singapore. He got captured in Singapore by the Japanese army during World War II and was put into a notorious concentration camp called Changi prison.

I found his details below on the Changi prison museum website. He was born in 1893 and his prison ID was 1257.

When he was eventually freed by the allies he was found to have contracted leprosy and other tropical diseases; he died 15 years later. I found some pictures relating to Changi and one is of inmates who were freed and put on the Australian hospital ship Manunda.

Changi, Singapore, 1943-01-26. A ceremonial parade was held on Selarang Barracks Square, Changi, to celebrate Australia Day, 1943. Members of 27 Infantry Brigade paraded under the command of Lt Col CH. Kappe. The salute was taken by Lt Col F.G. Galleghan, commander AIF POW's, who organised the parade.

Changi, Singapore. 1945-08-28. Copies of a leaflet were dropped over Changi prisoner of war camp. The reverse side contained instructions to the Japanese about treatment of prisoners. The annotation on the left of the leaflet was made by the diarist of the 8th Australian Division

Singapore. 1945-09-13. Prisoners of war released from Changi prison camp were evacuated from Singapore by the Australian Hospital Ship Manunda, the first Australian ship to arrive at Singapore after the surrender of the Japanese. Shown, a group of ex-prisoners of war, members of 8th Division, having a cup of tea while waiting for orders to embark aboard the Manunda.

Abbey Miss Out on Rannafast Glory

The brightly floodlit Healey Park in Omagh created an excellent setting on Wednesday 17th November, as the U16 footballers of St Patrick's College Maghera were crowned Ulster Colleges' Rannafast Cup Champions when they triumphed over opponents Abbey CBS Newry. faced might well have been much more.

A bright opening to the second half brought some renewed hope for the Down school as they continued with Brendan McKiernan in a sweeper role which gave them plenty of possession but also meant they faced a wall of Maghera defenders when they came close to goal.
