Storage & Maintenance

We remind Clubs of the importance of correct storage and maintenance of the Club defibrillator. Performance of the defibrillator may be compromised if the manufacturer's recommendations are ignored.

GAA Season Ticket

Consider yourself a dedicated county supporter? League matches in the springtime? Summer Sundays spent in 'neutral' venues? Want to follow the county all year round and save money in the process?

If so, the GAA Season Ticket is for you.

The GAA Season Ticket is county specific and code specific, so that means you need one for Hurling and one for Football. You pay an initial base price of €75 that includes all of your county's Allianz GAA National League round matches plus the opening Championship match.

It is then Play and Pay for each subsequent match that your county plays in whether you attend or not.

The Juvenile GAA Season Ticket has a base price of €10 and then Play and Pay applies. To learn more about the GAA Season Ticket visit www.gaa.ie/seasonticket.



GAA Club Planning Programme

The GAA has put in place a new Club planning programme, which provides advice and assistance to Clubs to help them put their own development plan in place. The programme, which has been successfully trialled in a number of

Clubs, provides a structured format to help the Club examine all areas of GAA activity and outline clear actions in order to move their club forward.

The main part of the programme is the Club planning workshop, where everyone in the community is invited to the Club premises for a two hour workshop. The feedback from this workshop and from other meetings is used to develop the plan. Any Club doing the programme receives a club plan pack, which includes a plan template. GAA Competition Management System (Fixtures & Results)

The GAA is rolling out the official GAA Competition Management System. The system is used throughout all levels of the Association (National, Provincial and County) and is centrally funded by Croke Park, with no cost to users for licences, training or ongoing system updates.

The system provides a wide range of functions and features to enable competition administrators to create manage and administer competitions.

It contains several features which help to minimise the administrative demands on volunteers (i.e. ability to clone competitions, perform bulk updates to fixtures and results). The system provides a central platform to manage all aspects of competition administration (i.e. two way SMS communication with match officials, automated feed of fixtures and results to media contacts). The system also provides functionality to support county fixture planners with their roles, whilst complying with the official rule book and adopting good governance.

The Croke Park Fixtures Department, County Fixture Planners and System Developers Servasport, have engaged in workshops and collaborated on the

product development plan. This has resulted in additional functionality being added to the system to meet the specific needs of GAA officials. The next significant system update is scheduled for January 2011, with many more new features and functionality to help streamline many of the processes associated with managing fixtures, referees and venues.



Club Focus – Killybegs GAA Club, Donegal

A thriving marine port and a passionate GAA community, the Killybegs GAA Club has created not only a legacy of excellence, but now a high quality grounds to reflect the admirable reputation the Club has built for itself since their founding in 1924.

Brand new main and practice pitches have been reconstructed to perfection – sand based for optimal performance. The clubhouse has been expanded to include four dressing rooms, a medical room, a referees' room, kitchen, various meeting rooms and public toilets. A gym will be added by the close of the year and discussion has arisen about a terrace expanding from the clubhouse overlooking the pitch.

In accommodating the supporter and member both inside the grounds and out, a brand new and improved car park area with over 350 car spaces has been accommodated. The facility cost the Club a total of €1.1 million to purchase and develop with the financial burden cushioned by the extraordinary efforts made through local fundraising events and Ulster Council grants.

The decision behind the ground's name change accurately reflects the heart and soul of the enthusiasm that surrounds the Club. The new Eamonn Byrne grounds were titled so to commemorate the memory of a strong Gael who died in 1988 during a match while representing Killybegs. The hard work and everlasting efforts the Killybegs community has put into reshaping their home is best represented through the spirit of a man who gave the ultimate sacrifice to compete for the town he loved.

Bloody Sunday Commemorative Lecture and Tour

The GAA Museum, national custodian of the archives of the GAA, will host an afternoon lecture with Tim Pat Coogan to mark the 90th anniversary of Bloody

Sunday. The lecture will take place at the museum on Saturday November 20 at 2.00pm.

Tim Pat Coogan, one of Ireland's best known historical writers, will discuss these events which resulted in the deaths of 13 civilian spectators and one Tipperary footballer, Michael Hogan. Dr. William Murphy, Irish Studies lecturer in DCU, will speak at the event and will explore the relationship of the GAA with the events unleashed by revolutionary nationalism in Ireland during the period 1914-1920.

The GAA Museum will also host a special Bloody Sunday Commemorative Guided Tour at 2.30pm on Sunday November 21st. Visitors will tour Croke Park stadium and the museum, which houses items such as an original match ticket and the whistle used by referee Mick Sammon.

GAA Social Initiative - November 2010

The GAA Social Initiative, conceived by President Mary McAleese as a means of facilitating male social engagement, recently held a successful seminar in Croke Park.

At the seminar, Seán Kilbride, Social Initiative Project Manager invited GAA Clubs to participate in an initial one-year pilot project and already the initiative has seen a large uptake with approximately 100 Clubs signed up and involved.

The seminar saw Clubs come together for a training workshop in Croke Park which Dr. Martin McAleese opened at the invitation of Uachtarán Chumann Lúthchleas Gael, Criostóir Ó Cuana. The Workshop delegates received a number of presentations from relevant age-related organisations and experts and concluded the day by offering their own ideas on how to implement the initiative. The Workshop proved to be an inspiring occasion as club representatives articulated the need for and the potential of the initiative.

Volunteers in the Pilot Project Clubs will begin to organise social activities for men in their respective areas and Club members are encouraged to support and participate in the project. There are no age restrictions on those wishing to get involved, either as a participant or volunteer. Those involved in each Club will decide themselves on the range of social activities to be organised but a possible menu of activities is included in the Social Initiative website at www.gaa.ie/socialinitiative. It is intended to develop a Discussion Forum in the near future on the website, where clubs can communicate their ideas and establish inter-club relationships.

It is hoped to expand the Social Initiative in 2011 and we would encourage other Clubs to participate, following the example set by those involved in the Pilot Project. The final objective is that, eventually, all GAA clubs will be inspired to contribute to this very worthwhile project.
